- (b.) Observation of Trial In Two Cases One Civil & One Criminal
- Student will attend two trial in the course. They will Maintain Daily Diary and enter the Various steps observed during there attendance on different days in the court assignment. This Scheme will carry
- 30 Marks
- (c.) Interviewing Technique & Pre-trial Preparation 30 Marks
- Each Student will further Observe the Preparation of Documents and Court Papers by the Advocate and the Procedure for filing of Suit/Petition will be recorded in the Diary.

(d.) The fourth components of this paper will be Viva-Voca on all the above three subjects.

This will carry 10 Marks.

Paper-X: DRAFTING, PLEADING & CONVEYANCING (PRACTICAL PAPER-II)

This course will be taught through class instruction and simulation exercise preferably with assistance of Practicing Lawyers/Retired Judges. Apart from teaching the relevant provisions, law, will be practically dealt with. The course will include 15 Exercises in drafting carrying a total of 45 marks and exercises in conveyancing another 45 marks (3 Marks for each exercises)
